# Wick Cricket Club Vs Colwinston Cricket Club (C.C.C) 23<sup>rd</sup> July 2025

The season was approaching the end, and after a hard-fought win vs Wick a few weeks prior. Wick invited Colwinston down to their stomping ground looking for revenge in a Vale of Glamorgan Derby. After winning the toss, Colwinston Captain R. Morgan chose his team to field first, O. Piper was first to bowl against M Williams. Piper fired a few good balls in after his usual half a mile run up. M. Williams replied with several singles and a couple of boundaries to retire on 26. Veteran Byron Davies showed his class by bowling very well, against J. Cole and C. Dixon, however both players still managed to get their eye in and retired for 25 runs each. I. Foxall was next to bowl and bowl well he did, only conceding 11 runs across his two overs. R. Cole put in a fielding masterclass with his first catch of the season to get C. Day out for no runs. R. Milne got Wick back in the game though striking numerous boundaries and eventually attainting 26 runs before retiring. S. Morgan and R. Cole each put in a good shift bowling, with S. Morgan getting a wicket on only his second ball. O Thomas and K. Thomas both struggled against the Colwinston bowlers, with both only striking a handful of runs before O. Thomas was caught by B. Horton. A. Finucane and BE. Horton were the final pair to bowl, both struggled to keep the batting tally down, with A. **Finucane** conceding 27 runs and **B. Horton** conceding 19 runs. After the first innings Wick had 176 runs after 20 overs. Colwinston were next up to bowl, R. Morgan went with what he calls specialist batsman M. Davies who was paired with R. James. M Davies didn't quite live up to his reputation, only hitting eight runs across five overs. Whilst his batting partner struck 28 before retiring. The next pairs did not fare well at all, with **A. Finucane** getting a single run before being caught by R. Milne. S. Thomas only hit seven. The less said about B. Horton the better, zero runs and bowled by S. Stratten. Colwinston began to struggle badly, they needed a change in luck, and this did arrive with **R. Morgan** smacking three fours and a six to eventually retire on 25 runs. O. Piper broke that good trend with a dismal two runs, bowled by Wick talisman K. Thomas. I. Foxall had a man of the match worthy performance easily reaching 25 runs along with his batting partner R. Cole. S. Morgan and B. Davies made the final pairing, S. Morgan managed to hit seven singles, whilst Byron faced a single ball and managed to hold his own and see the game out. Colwinston had 148 runs after 20 overs. Wick proved themselves to be worthy winners on home soil and were cheered off to the home supporters (of three people). # **COLWINSTON COMMUNITY COUNCIL- Cyngor Cymuned Tregolwyn**

Shortly before the summer break Vice Chairman, Councillor Huw Thomas, presented the annual report for 2024/25. The full document can be found on the Community Council website and is summarised here, along with the date of our upcoming September meeting.

#### Annual Report 2024/25

#### :: Chairman's Foreword

The Community Council has invested funds throughout the year to improve and maintain the areas of the village within its ownership. Little Hill has benefited from a reconstruction of the steps at a cost of around £5,000, and once again it is a safe pathway linking Church Lane to the Sycamore Tree. The Old Ford area is being developed in partnership with the Old Ford Project Group and circa £10,000 has been committed to that work by the Community Council. During the year, ownership of the Village Green was obtained and the War Memorial has been cleaned and newly engraved at a cost of around £2,500. Additionally the area known as Spinney Bank has been maintained, and the path leading from Church Lane to Twyn Yr Eglwys cleared of debris and made safe to use. Thanks to the persistence of Councillor Lewis, the balance of Section 106 monies from the Redrow development were used to replace the benches outside school and on the village green, and to purchase a bench for the Old Ford area. Additionally, the bench from the village green was relocated to the Old Ford. Councillor Lewis was successful in registering the woodlands area of the Old Ford Project as part of the National Forest of Wales.

A number of villagers brought issues of concern to the Community Council that were successfully resolved. The Boundary Commission's recommendation that our Council and Llangan Council be merged in May 2027 has been confirmed by the Welsh Government. No further details are known.

The Community Council works hard to ensure that Colwinston remains a wonderful environment for all villagers and grateful thanks are due to everyone who works on behalf of the village in so many capacities. *Councillor Gareth Jones, Chairman of Colwinston Community Council.* 

# :: Vale of Glamorgan Councillor

Councillor Christine Cave has been the elected County Councillor covering Colwinston since 2017. During 2024-25 she continued to support CCC in their interactions with the Vale of Glamorgan council. She has supported the opposition boundary changes and mergers of community councils, and has backed the conservation projects in the village and matters raised by residents. #### **Activities and Projects**

# :: Village Green and War Memorial

This year, Colwinston Community Council's ownership of the Village Green was confirmed after the tireless work of Councillor Ed Lewis to correct the official record. Work was undertaken to clean the war memorial on the Village Green, and to replace the engraved plaque. The refreshed memorial was prepared in time for the village to commemorate 80 years since VE Day.

## :: Boundary Changes

Confirmation was received that our Council will be merged with others nearby, reducing our representation from seven to three members on the new body when it is established in 2027.

#### :: Old Ford Project

Councillors have continued to support the Old Ford Project Group in their work to revitalise this important and beautiful area to the south of the village. A significant proportion of the council's income is spent annually on this work. The woodland now offers a safe and welcoming environment for visitors, with school children and conservation volunteers among those regularly enjoying the surroundings. Tree inspection and controlled felling continues to be necessary in parts of the woodland, which ensures the area remains safe and vibrant. The area is set to be enhanced with the planting of bluebells, while a new bridge now crosses the stream to the west of the ford.

### :: Supporting Village Life

The council continues to work hard in the interests of Colwinston and its residents. Maintenance work around the area was funded by the council, including the cutting of grass verges and clearing paths. New steps were installed on Little Hill, while the Council gladly funds the purchase of Christmas trees every December for the Village Green and the churchyard. The annual remembrance service was organised by the council and held at the memorial on the Village Green, led by the Reverend Angela Cooper. Wreaths were laid by local organisations in memory of those who have died, while Colwinston's status as a Thankful Village was remembered by recalling the men who survived the First World War and returned to the community.

# PETS OF THE MONTH


